







Second President of Mexico, 1829–1831









#### "Race," Slavery, and the Texas War of Independence


- [Santa Ana's Army] is a merciless soldiery advancing on Texas to give liberty to our slaves and make slaves of ourselves." Matagorda Committee of Safety and Correspondence, 1835.
- [The Mexican Army] sought a "general extermination" of the people regardless of age or sex. The "treacherous and bloody enemy" intended to recruit black slaves "as instruments of his unholy and savage work…" Brazoria Safety and Correspondence Committee., 1835.
- "Our Negroes are on the tip-toe of expectation and rejoicing that the Mexicans are coming to make them free." Unidentified Brazoria slaveholder, 1836.
- [The Texas Revolution is a contest between the barbarism of a "mongrel Spanish-Indian and negro race, against civilization






## Surrender of Santa Anna at the Battle of San Jacinto,








## The Texas Constitution and Slavery, 1837

- All persons of color who were slaves for life previous to their emigration to Texas, and who are now in bondage, shall remain in the like state of servitude.
- No future Texas Congress shall have the right to prevent U.S. emigrants from bringing their slaves to the Republic.
- No Texas Congress shall in the future emancipate slaves.

## The Texas Constitution and Free Blacks, 1837

- All persons resident in Texas as of January 1, 1837 are citizens of the Republic except Africans and their descendants, and Indians and their descendants.
- No free person of African descent shall be permitted to reside permanently in the Republic without the consent of the Texas Congress.

## Greenbury Logan and the Texas Revolution
